the way that leads to the place where I am going."





CHRISTMAS DAY – VIEW FROM THE ALTAR

Yeldho Perunal also known as the festival of advent is celebrated on 25th of December.

In the Jacobite church, the Christmas liturgy is celebrated during Christmas Eve. The service begins with the evening prayer and concludes with the Holy Qurbana. The special prayers are taken from the "Andu Thaksa".

Lighting of fire (Theejwala sushrusha) is the main part of the Christmas liturgy. A pit generally in the shape of a cross has to be dug in the courtyard in front of the church or any other convenient place where people can participate in the ceremony. The palm leaves used on Palm Sunday and the cotton used on Good Friday are placed in the pit and arranged for the theejwala.

After the 3rd kauma of the midnight prayer the procession starts from the church to the venue of theejwala. All church articles such as Melketti, Kodi, Marukasa, Kaimani, Sleeba, candles etc. are used for the procession.

On reaching the location of the theejwala, the sexton reads from the epistle of St. Paul to Hebrews which is followed by the evangelion reading by the priest from the Gospel according to St. Luke.

During this reading, the priest lights the fire from all four sides. At this time, people have to walk around the theejwala chanting the prayer of angels (Malakhamarude sthuthippu) and put incense in the fire. After the completion of the reading the procession returns to church for the sleeba akhosham.

The sleeba akhosham is followed by the remaining prayers of the liturgy. The special liturgy of Christmas is concluded with the Holy Qurbana.

A CHRISTMAS SCENT!

Come December Ist, a special warm feeling fills each one of us. The smell of mixed fruits soaking in rum sets off the holiday season. Not to forget, waking up to the sensory delight of home-made delights like cakes, murrukus, wine, etc. all of which according to me is a true labor of love.

I would like to share with you all my family's recipe of a personal favorite, the infamous rose cookie (or as we call it, Achappam). It's light, crisp and not too sweet and when eaten hot it is almost like a version of a crisp waffle. Here is the recipe, handed down two generations, hoping you enjoy it as much as we do!:)

Ingredients:

- I. 0.5 Kg/ 2 cups Maida
- 2. 0.5 cup Milk (Alternatively coconut milk can also be used)
- 3. I Egg
- 4. I tsp White or Black Sesame seeds
- 5. 0.25 cup Sugar
- 6. A pinch of Salt to taste
- 7. Rose Cookie Mold (Achu)

Let's get Cooking!

Mix the milk, egg and sugar. Beat it well. Into the mix, fold in the flour little by little until there are no lumps left and you have a smooth batter.

Add in the salt and sesame seeds and mix well. The batter should be the consistency of dosa batter, add a bit of water if you feel it needs to loosen up a bit.

Take a kadai and pour the oil into it for deep frying. Let the oil heat. Place the mold into the oil and allow it to heat.

Once the mold is sufficiently hot, place it into the batter up to 3/4th of the mold. Place the mold dipped in batter into the oil and wait until it starts to come away from the mold. You can choose to shake the mold to help the rose cookie separate.

Take the rose cookie out once golden brown and place on a napkin to drain the oil. Allow to cool. Repeat the process.

Your home-made rose cookies are now ready to eat! :)

Conversation with Grace Thomas Cherickal, fondly called Gracy aunty, as told to Nikita Sunil and coordinated by Joshua Philip Mathew.

I. At what age did you start singing?

I started singing in the Jacobite choir around the age of 28-30 after my marriage.

But from the age of 4 I have been singing and was part of the CSI choir in my home church in Kerala.

2. How did you come about this passion for singing?

I joined the church choir as a child and have sung all my life. God has given me the talent to sing and it is a crime if I do not use it. Although I have not trained formally, we had choir masters who taught us everything from singing, to the disciple required to be a part of the choir.

All my brothers sing as well so we had a good time growing up. We would win all the competitions, the next generation too is blessed with good voices.

5. What is your advice to the youth of today?

I would say, visiting the homes of elderly people above 70, especially those who are alone and sick is important.

A few songs, a reading from the bible and a prayer, this fellowship is very much necessary and it will make the youth stronger as well. This would bring joy and happiness to their homes and the blessings would be carried forward.
